SENIOR CLASS PROPHECY

As I advanced toward him he gazed up and then I recognized him as our Honorable secretary of the Senior class, at Kremlin, Ivan Lee Emerson. He said when he graduated from Kremlin High, he went in search of work and this was the only job he could find. He also told me that he was married and was the proud father of seven children.

I then motored towards the Great Lakes. Upon arriving at Lake Michigan, I saw a beautiful mansion. I noticed a smart-looking lady sitting on the veranda. As I started up the walk she advanced towards me and whom do you suppose it was, none other than Bettie Tribble. He flashed me one of those "Laughing Smiles," and I knew at once it was Lawrence Johnson. He told me that he had at last gained success in life. He was Doctor of "The Children Health Department," there in Springfield.

When I arrived in Paducah, it was nearly seven o'clock and I went at once to the Metropolitan theater. There in the ticket booth sat an old friend whom I thought I knew but wasn't quite sure. I went up to her and asked her if she wasn't Sally Guffey, and she said she was. She recognized me then, and while we were talking, the manager walked up. He told me that one of our best friends had smashed Hollywood and was playing in one of his pictures, but he wouldn't tell me who she was. We went in and as the picture opened I recognized Carolyn Chester, playing as a famous movie-actress. I spent the night with Sally, who had grown into a very attractive woman, and early next morning I set out for the remainder of my journey.



Upon arriving in Enid, we decided to see how far the Enid Army Air Field had progressed. We arrived at the field at 10 o'clock and who should we see but Ruby Voth. She said she had been a parachutist now for three years. Of course, I was a little surprised, and asked her why she did this. She said that if Franklin got frightened when it came his turn to jump, she could reassure him that it wasn't half so bad, and that she would always be one jump behind him.

We stayed two weeks and then came back to Los Angeles where I parted with Lila Mae Johnson.

After enjoying a personal visit with the classmates of Kremlin High of 1945, I went home inspired with many themes and ideas for another volume of poetry.

Is a girl on whom we can rely.



Lawrence Johnson wills his straight hair to Le Roy Johnson.

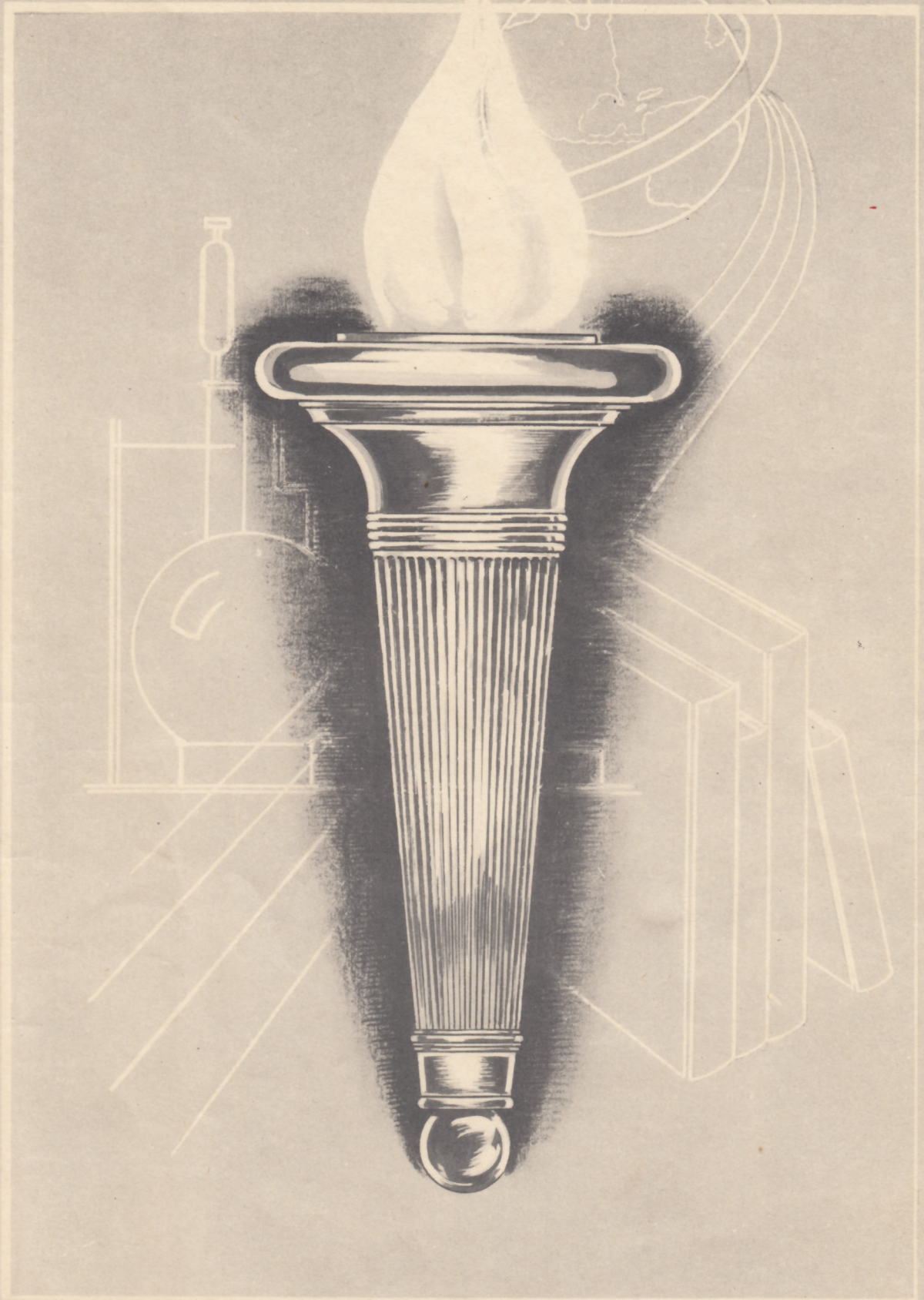

BOYS BASKETBALL:

The '44-'45 boys basketball team ended the year with a remarkable showing of true sportsmanship, good team cooperation, and superior coaching for the entire season. This year the boys played nineteen games. They won 8 games, and were defeated in 11. The squad this year was composed mostly of Sophomores and Juniors, having only three Senior boys.

In the Conference Tournament we were defeated by Hunter at the Phillips University Gym by a score of 33 to 19.

With the fine material that we have, everyone feels confident of a winning boys team next year, and we are hoping they will bring home many victories.

The Kremlin "B" team played three games this season and were unable to obtain a victory in any of them. Their first game was with Hunter, 34-9. The second game, 24-18, also with Hunter, and the third, with Carrier again being defeated 47-35.

GIRLS BASKETBALL:

Kremlin has again organized a team this year, not having a girls team here since 1936. They have done remarkably well for their first year. They have played sixteen games this season winning four. In the Conference Tournament they were defeated by Hillsdale, in a "bang-up" game at the Phillips University Gym by a score of 30 to 22.

In the first game at Hunter, Kremlin went wild with a 25-1 victory. In the second game at Kremlin, they again gained victory 18-6.

In the tournament played at Phillips University, they won their first game with Hayward by a score of 15-5. They then beat Carrier 13-3 and came out winners of the tournament.

This spring they have played only one game at Carrier, but Lady Luck wasn't with them and they were defeated 5-1. They will meet them again this Spring but they are determined to overtake them this time on their own field.

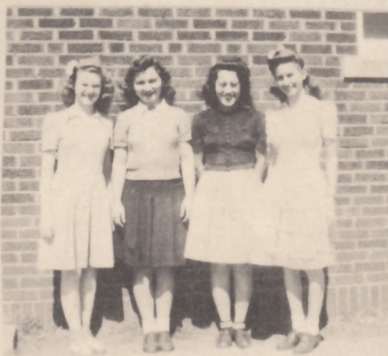

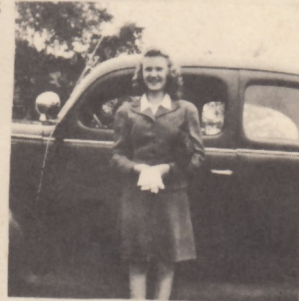
