## WELCOMING SPEECH

Ladies and Gentlemen:

For several years we have been day dreaming about high school graduation. Always it has seemed that it would never really come to us. Still we worked toward that end, saw others graduate in classes ahead of us, and looked forward to the day that we would be the ones to welcome parents and friends to our graduating exercises. The hour has now arrived and it is my pleasure to welcome you, on behalf of the Senior Class of 1946, to our graduation. In my few minutes before you I will tell you my idea of what youth owes a world which was at war.

Most of us do little thinking on a subject as deep as this except on such an occasion as this when it becomes our obligation to speak upon the things that concern us and the relation we have to the future of our country. The debt we owe to society and national life has not been an everyday topic. Some of us perhaps have paid little attention to the fact that it really exists, and much less, to exactly what that obligation is.

Looking at that question from a purely selfish point of view it is logical that if we want a certain kind of world, in our case one free from tyranny and oppression, we owe it at least to ourselves to try to make it that kind of a world.

We look at the results our parents have attained, as probably all generations have looked at their father's handiwork, with some misgivings. Besides the war and the involved international situation, labor troubles and the social problems of crime, divorce and racial discrimination loom up. We wonder if the world has improved much in the last generation.

The only way to meet our obligation to the American way of life, to make the world our kind of a world, lies within ourselves and our own attitudes of mind. Surely we cannot go far wrong in any action we may take if our fundamental attitudes are right.

Firm beliefs will be important to the people who are to face the problems which will confront us. We will need faith in our ideals, in our opinions, in our own strength and ability to deal with situations, and above all, in God. Self-confidence and the will to succeed are essential to any undertaking. The person who is not sure he will succeed is doomed to failure from the start.

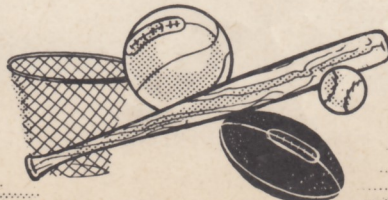
We especially need firm beliefs as far as religion is concerned. Little differences in doctrine and creed are unimportant, so long as people have a sincere and enduring faith in God.

The final attitude of mind that will be necessary to us, if we are to pay our debt to the world we want to live in is that which for lack of a better name we call understanding. It means more than tolerance. It includes kindness and justice toward the customs, ambitions and weaknesses of people who are different from ourselves. It is a fellowship feeling for all people and an interest in their lives and welfare.

Perhaps we look upon the future and its problems with hope and eagerness unwarranted by present world conditions. We are sure that these difficulties must be faced daily with calmness, with the spirit of cooperation and with confidence in our ideals. Our opinions must be tempered with an effort to understand the other man's problem. If we can do these things and pass on these characteristics to our children certainly the whole world will benefit.

Today is no time to sit calmly in easy chairs and talk about a democracy that works. It is a time in which every man, woman and child must combine efforts to make it work. We can all thank God for a country where there is food for all, where hope abounds and where faith has not been destroyed. We can thank God for America, my land and your land.

## OUR FAITH IS IN AMERICA

Ladies and Gentlemen:

As we come before you today, candidates for graduation from high school, we are confronted with many perplexing questions. Foremost among these is the question, in what are we to believe? In the past young people graduating from high school had something sound upon which to stand. The world was not in distress, fearing the news that the next tide might bring in. The economic system was not rocking with change, the world had not just come out of the greatest war there has ever been and was trying to settle down to peaceful times. In a time like the present we have to think carefully to pick out that in which we are to believe. Of the many things about which we could not be sure there is one exception, and that is America. Our faith is in America. America is great today because many great men of the past have believed firmly in something concerning their lives and the welfare of people in general. Many such men have participated in the historic development of our country. Their faith made America strong. Our faith is going to keep her strong.

One of those men from the history books whose faith in an idea led to the beginning of America was Christopher Columbus. As a boy he lived simply in a city by the sea where he dreamed of lands far away. He longed to go in search of them. He visited the ships in the harbor and with boyish curiosity questioned the sailors from foreign ports. Thus he learned many things unknown, for things unseen, for what lies beyond the sea. His belief in that idea led the way to a new world and to golden opportunities for millions to others who had had a similar faith.

It was on a cold December day in 1620 that another such group of people moored their bark on the wild New England shore. They did not seek adventure. They did not seek gold, but they came to enjoy freedom of conscience and to worship God in their own way. They came so that their children might grow up as self-respecting citizens and enjoy the blessings of a free people. They knew there would be hardships to endure. They knew they would probably never see their native land again. When the Mayflower sailed back for their old country the next spring they did not go with her. They pinned their faith on a new land, America.

As the years went on thousands of other people of the old world sought freedom, safety and shelter in the new country. There were no large cities, no great paved highways or streamlined trains to await their coming, but there was land of plenty. There were uncounted acres of deep rich soil, endless tracts of fine timberland; oceans, lakes and rivers teeming with fish. The plains re-echoed to the stampede of thousands of bison while beneath the soil were yet to be found the world's greatest stores of oil, coal and minerals.

Our pilgrim forefathers were unwilling to relinquish the liberties they had found in this new world. They had brought with them free minds, free citizenship and a representative form of government. These three things formed the basis of our government. They declared in words that rang around the world, the "inalienable right of all men to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." They set up the ideal of equality of opportunity for all persons to be what they have it in them to be. This freedom has been the goal that American men and women have ever cherished. We of the new generation now

coming before you have not the least intention of giving it up for the ancient and ever recurring doctrines of racial dominance, of a glorified state, of and arbitrarily stratified society.

From the pages of American history the names of John Marshall, Andrew Jackson, Henry Clay, Daniel Webster, Abraham Lincoln, Woodrow Wilson and Franklin Roosevelt stand out as men who had great faith in something which contributed to the strength of America.

Individual freedom involves individual responsibility. Each generation must earn by hard work, devotion to duty, loyal cooperation and great sacrifice its right to be free. Each generation must prove over again that it can serve the common good. Our generation will be no exception.

America has just come out of the greatest war in its life. The sacrifices made by the American people were supreme. Americans have never liked war. They have secured their greatest blessings in peace-time pursuits. This does not mean that they will not fight when necessary.







No high school class has yet graduated during our lives which faced as critical a period as the one ahead of us. No other such class has faced as many opportunities and responsibilities. No other class has had to consider so carefully in what things to believe.

With the closing of this occasion today we cease to exist as a high school class and it becomes my duty to say farewell. We say farewell to the Board of Education which has so ably directed the school system. We thank you for your consideration and the generous application of our wisdom.

To the members of the faculty we say farewell. They have endeavored to encourage the good in us and develop our individual possibilities. You have been good friends as well as our instructors.

To our parents we do not say farewell, but we wish to thank you for making possible for us a good public school education. As we say farewell to the school you have provided for us we hope that our benefits will give you joy and pride and partly repay for your work.

Classmates, we may say farewell but there is no farewell between us. As we go different ways in our lives to come we will be always held together through bright days and dark ones by the common possession of the principles and ideals taught in this school.

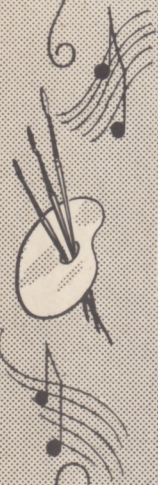
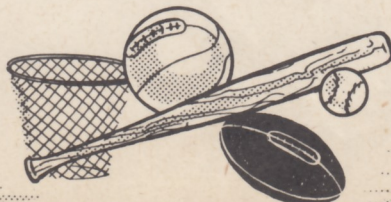

This made eleven Seniors to graduate in the class of 1946, which are LeRayne and LeRoy Tefft, Wilbur Janzen, Bill Johnson, Louis Kirkpatrick, Robert Voth, Tena Voth, Helena Toews, May Bittle, Alvina Barkman, and myself, with Mr. Chelf as our sponser.

This ends the History of the Senior Class of 1945-1946.

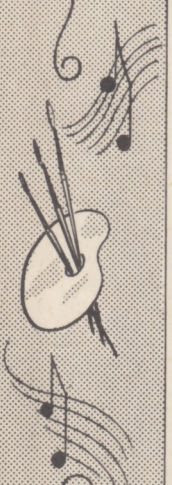

To the Freshman Class we will our ability to concentrate and our worn out excuses.


To the typing classes of 1947 we leave a bunch of worn out typewriters.

Oh! My! Any way we represent the Seventh & Eighth grades. Our teacher, Mrs. Thesman, has made nice boys and girls out of us.



In the all school Christmas Operetta "Christmas in the Circus." Our room were the cinnamon bears, pop corn balls and the monkeys.

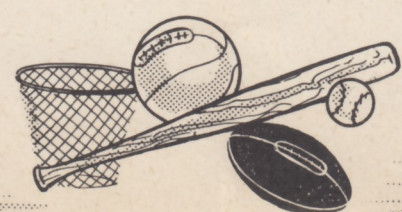

The girls had the misfortune of losing their first game in the Conference Tournament to Waukomis by a score of 29 to 25.

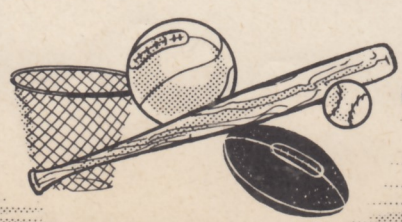
In the Invitational Tournament, defeat came their way again in the 1st game. Big Four scoring 35 tallies when our girls hit the basket for 25 points.
