The Annual Queen was chosen from our class. The Chief Editor of the Brenc was chosen from the Senior Class and also one of the Class Editors.

We have enjoyed going to Kremlin School during our high school years, and we wish that old Kremlin High School will be an enjoyable place for everyone in the future.

We are fortunate in having Mrs. Rankin teaching our geometry and checking our theorms. We try to become good citizens under Mr. Rankins capable guidance in Civics.

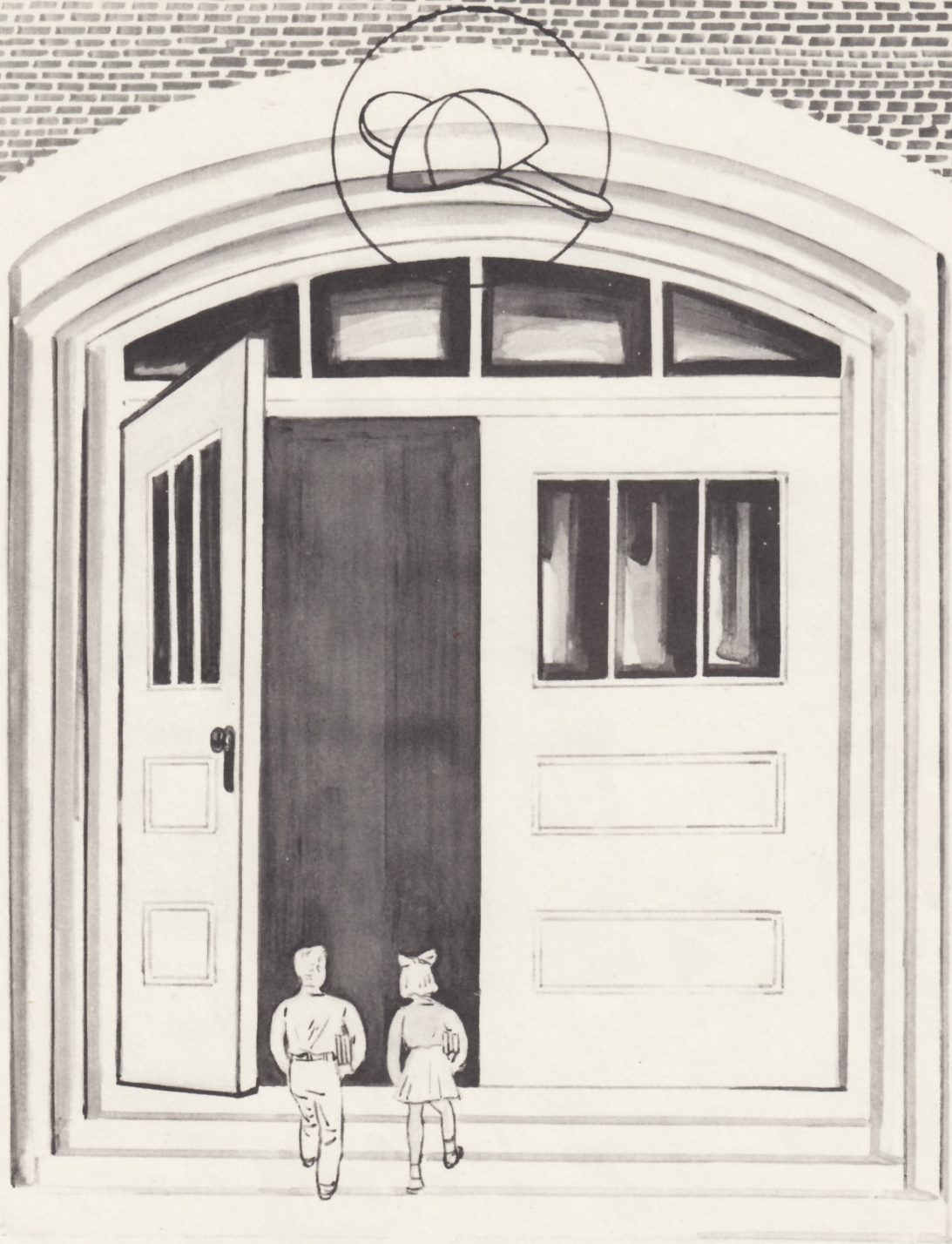
Mrs. Gibbs watches our verbs and infinatives and gives us an appreciation of music in chorus work.

MAY--Was the best month of all because we knew it wouldn't be long. But then the worry--would we pass or not. VACATION!

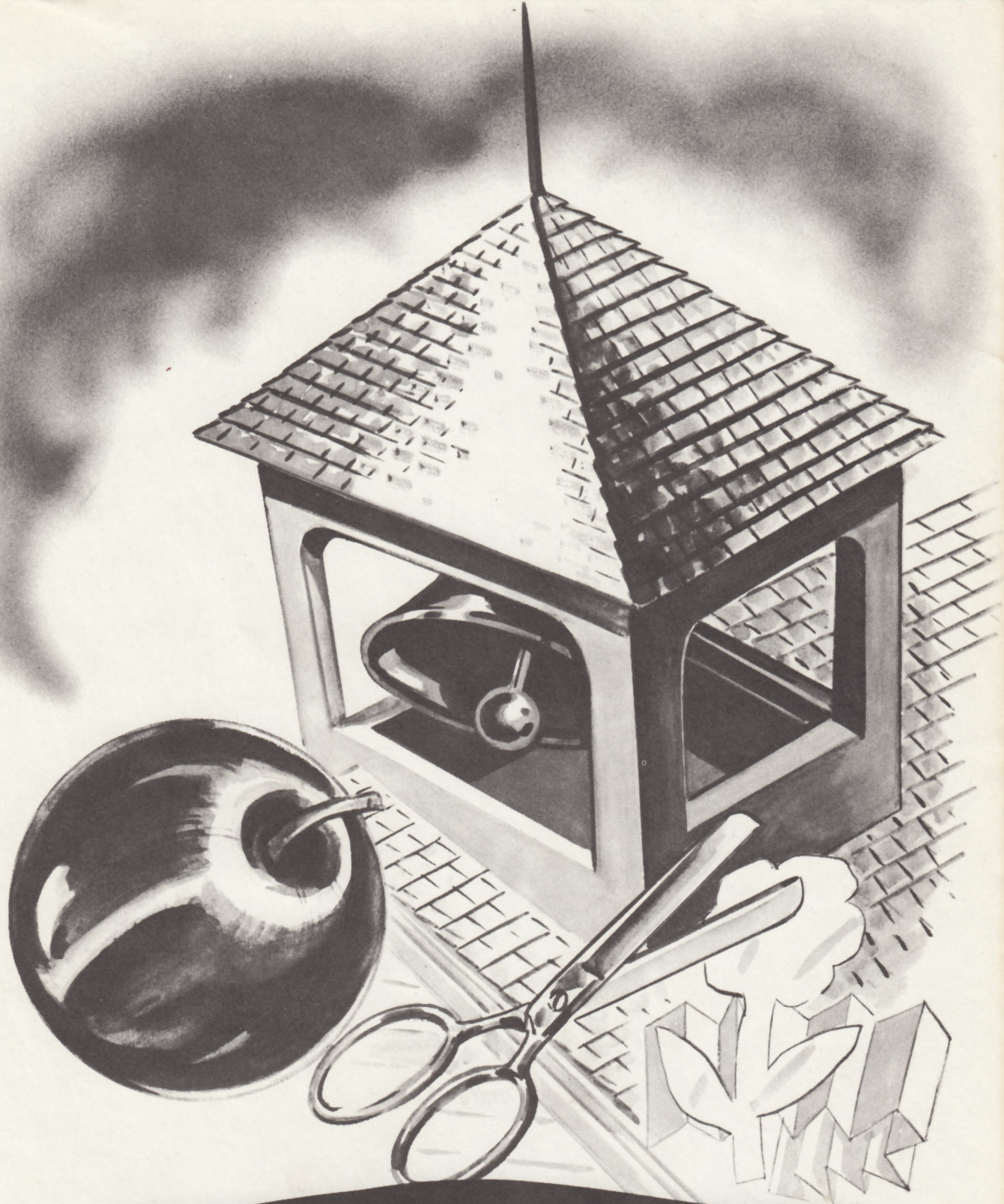

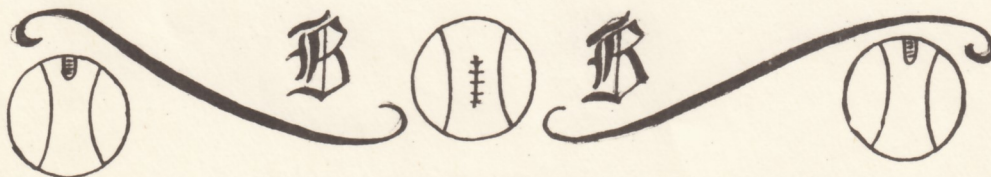
### GIRLS BASKETBALL



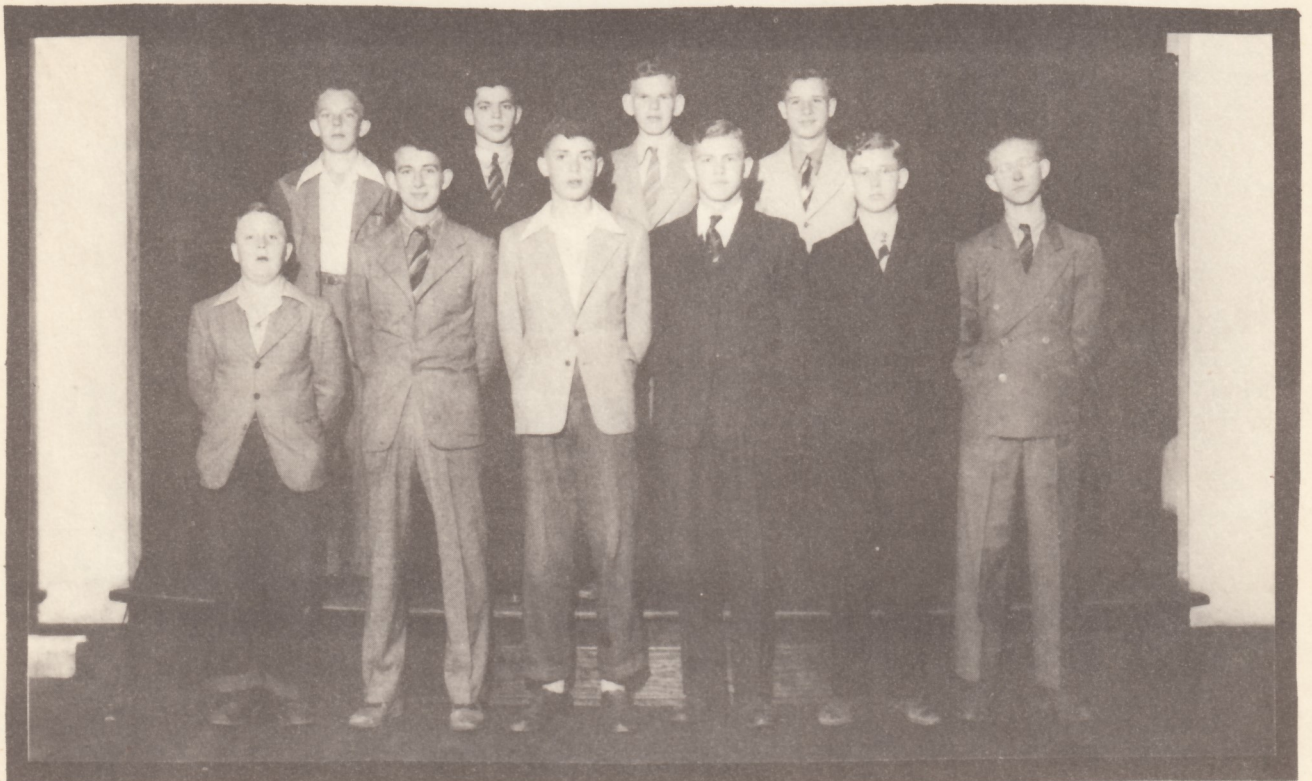

December found all music groups hard at work on our Christmas program which was given at the Community Hall on December 20.

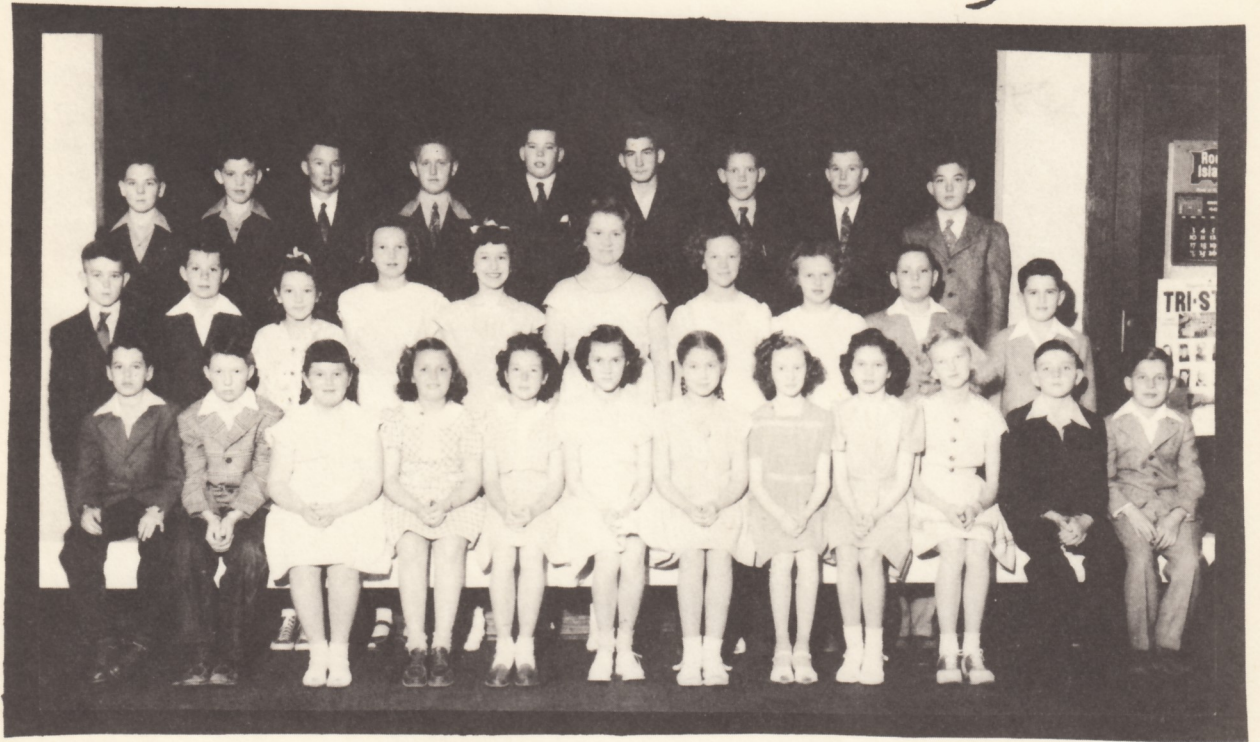

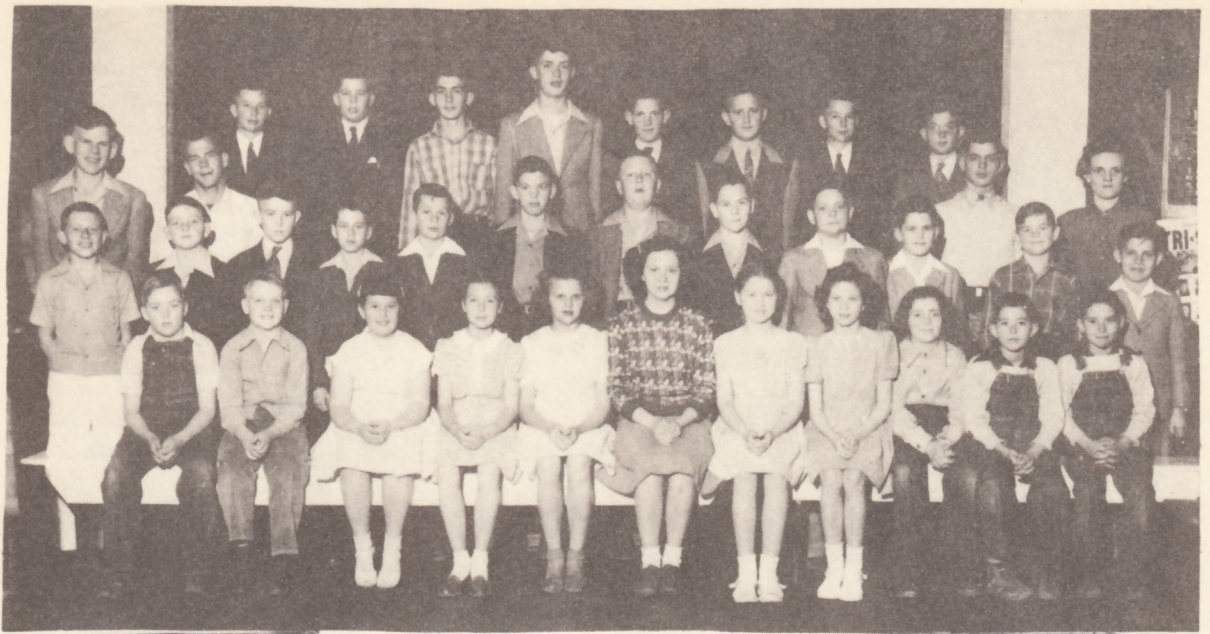
