





Roma wills her position as Hubbard's secretary to Archie Braun, and her ability to make "A's" to Cecil Wells.


Leona Mae wills her natural curly hair to Nilene Reed and her ability to get along with all the boys to Rubena Barkman.


The P. T. A. presented pins to the 3 honor students of the Junior class, Helen Kroeker, Louis Janzen, and Deloris Miller.


After returning to school from our Christmas vacation we acquired another addition to our class, Theodore Fields from Guymon, Oklahoma.

During Education week High School and Grade Chorus presented a program at the Christian Church. They also presented numbers between acts at the Christmas Operetta.


Gerry Toews and Mary Joy Zaloudek gave a musical reading. In November the Music department furnished the program for the School Marms and School Masters.


SEVENTH AND EIGHTH GRADES


THIRD AND FOURTH GRADES


